I am of course also looking forward to getting out into the field and meeting as many of you within the sport, the people who make the sport, the people who drive the sport on to ímprove and achievé more.



The U21 men's lacrosse team fought valiantly to earn a 6th place finish at the World Championships. As lacrosse continues to recover from the world-wide pandemic there was a promising 8.4% growth in domestic lacrosse participation. The re-emergence of competitive University lacrosse saw an enthusiastic reception. Our Further Education program engag ed over 4500 students across 46 colleges, and our domestic leagues saw fervent participation from 221 teams.

More than 1500 volunteers – coaches, officials, administrators, and many more supported lacrosse participation. Your devotion is not just the backbone but the hearth eat of our sport's resurgence.

Looking forward, we know that we have exciting opportunities to promote the sport, succeed at international level and increase the opportunities and numbers playing our great game. We have exciting plans for development of the Fly, our talent and elite system and for our community game.

The Fly, our pioneering elite level competition, returned for its second edition in 2022 showcasing our national domestic competition across both men's and women's lacrosse utilising the new Sixes format of the sport.

After a successful first year in which we gained positive feedback from our competing athletes, the growth of the The Fly has gone from strength to strength in both its offering to players and supporters.

As the Sixes programme domestically and internationally continues to develop, we have recognised the opportunities surrounding the format and the benefits of The Fly to supporting high-performance, international athletes on this new journey.

Indeed, Sixes made its introduction to the international arena at the World Games last summer with almost all of the players representing British Lacrosse having first honed their Sixes skills at The Fly.

So as well as giving a platform for our top athletes to express themselves on the biggest stage, it demonstrates a strong progression pathway for aspiring young talent looking to follow in the footsteps of our current international stars.

As an established event now providing a new high-level playing opportunity, The Fly is now also being incorporated into the annual calendars of our national squads programmes to complement their training cycles.

Following the successful launch of the The Fly and the bold visual style created for the lead brand, the next step has been the creation of strong individual team identities for our four sides.

The development of clear visual identities will be crucial in developing brand loyalty for both players and viewers, as well as positively promoting The Fly as a commercial asset with a distinct narrative and vision.

The designs have given each team their own character and given fans distinct sides to throw their support behind - As The Fly moves forward these team identities will also open up opportunities for further revenue streams through clothing and merchandise offerings to allow the supporters show their support and wear their colours with pride.

We have also continued to put further investment into the digital offering for The Fly for 2022.

In meeting the requirements of new audiences, we have looked to create a product that is much more than just an in-person event and promotes the sport in a fresh way with the aim of reaching people who may engage with sport in different ways and adding value to their support.

Extended work was carried out in engaging players and supporters with the team brands and the competition in the lead up to the event, creating a year-long narrative to The Fly through player selection, squad preparations and finally competition.

Now we have established a leading product on the field, the next steps for The Fly will be to place clear effort into developing the spectator experience associated with the event and providing an experience that matches the action on the field and builds on our digital spectator engagement.

The increased visibility of Sixes through The Fly has no doubt also built the appetite for the game among our existing community game and we are determined to continue to champion the best of our men's and women's athletes using this fast, fun format.



GOVERNANCE

The purpose of the Annual Governance Statement is to report on the governance of EL for 2022-23 and should be read in conjunction with the Directors Report in the Audited Accounts 2022-23. It provides transparency and accountability on the governance structure which oversees decisions made to achieve the objectives set out in the key strategic documents for and driving culture underpinned by the core values.

We're thrilled to announce the appointment of Vicky Lowe as the new Chair, leading the charge as we embark on a new chapter of growth and excellence. Stepping aside from the Chair role, Hannah Bowe takes on the vital position of INED, as we retain her wealth of experience on our Board.

But that's not all — our board has undergone exciting changes! Susan Gordon and John Neal have made way for fresh faces, Tim Hunt, and Jill Giddins, who have taken up INED roles to drive commercial and governance endeavors. Our team is evolving, reflecting our commitment to diversity, and ensuring all voices are heard.

The pursuit of progress has been relentless, and our Governance and Nominations Group has been at the forefront. With steady support from Sport England, Perret Laver, and Hartman Mason, we've designed a template for future recruitment, setting the gold standard for our governance structure.

In a stride towards modernisation, our board continues to embrace diversity, with 42% identifying as female and 8% as BAME. Not stopping there, our board sub-committees now boast 33% female representation, creating an inclusive powerhouse of talent. Our new Independent Chair, who identifies as female, brings a fresh perspective to the helm.

Safety and excellence have been our guiding beacons. EL's board agendas cover every aspect of governance and overseeing risk, from Anti-Doping to



Safeguarding, and ensuring we remain at the forefront of good practices. To facilitate informed decision-making, safeguarding, wellbeing, and anti-doping summaries are now embedded in the CEO report, a standing agenda item.

Collaboration has been the key to our resilience, and our monthly meetings with Regional Association chairs continue to foster a robust network, cascading good governance and strategic clarity to the volunteers within the domestic game. We've also revamped our data protection policies, ensuring everyone involved is aware of our practices and regulatory commitments.

The journey towards safe sport never ends! We're thrilled to have received positive feedback from the CPSU and the recent safeguarding review, validating our unwavering commitment to safeguarding. Additionally, our proactive approach to anti-doping and concussion education ensures a safe environment for all lacrosse enthusiasts.

The EL Board has a keen eye on our participants' welfare and stakeholders' interests. Armed with key monitoring information and strategic plans, we scrutinize every decision to ensure we stay true to our priorities and uphold the highest standards.

We're setting our sights on the future with the ratification of our People Strategy, ED&I Strategy, and DIAP (diversity and inclusion action plan), all designed to champion good governance and organizational culture. Partnering with the Anne Craft Trust, we're developing the Adults at Risk framework, improving our commitment to safeguarding in 2024.

As we navigate the integrity framework landscape, aligning with other NGBs, we're excited for the road ahead. Lacrosse is a place of passion, dedication, and unity. Together, we'll continue to soar to new heights and make the sport an even greater force of joy, inclusion, and excellence.

Safety and standards are paramount. That's why we've introduced a bespoke safeguarding course, tailor-made for England Lacrosse, and offered it completely free for our members. This targeted approach led to a whopping 54% uptick in course takers, ensuring our lacrosse community is well-equipped with relevant knowledge.

This initiative underscores our commitment to ensure that every individual in the lacrosse community, from coaches and officials to club volunteers, is aptly trained. With over 1,350 officiating qualifications and 500 coaching badges in the mix, and a beautifully balanced 52% female representation, we're on the right path.

However, while many hold qualifications, not all are active in officiating and coaching. Our mission? To ignite their passion and create abundant opportunities for them to grow and thrive. Join us, as we continue to redefine the sport, champion our workforce, and make waves in the world of lacrosse!

With our sights set on the future, we're investing in our digital platforms. This means enhanced support for our workforce and volunteers, an abundance of online resources, and direct communication channels with seasoned mentors to guide every step of your journey with us.

In light of our recent talent and performance evaluation, we've done some deep thinking. It's clear our top-tier coaches need tailored coaching and robust support to bring out the best in our promising athletes. Excitingly, our revamped Talent Coaching Course launches next year! Expect a holistic approach, tapping into raw athlete potential and expanding entry avenues into our programme.

Beyond standard coaching credentials, we're setting our sights wider. LACS PROGRAMME

The Lacrosse Accredited College Scheme (LACS), in partnership with AoC Sport and The Lacrosse Foundation, continues to provide an excellent pathway in which to engage with a previously untapped sector.

A flagship partnership initiated with Burnley College where the FE intervention has generated an increase in activity for young people alongside impacting on narrowing inequalities and is now reaching the stage where the institution is able to provide a platform for a wider community hub.

The developments in Burnley, with the college approaching England Lacrosse to provide wider engagement in the community, demonstrates the potential of the programme and the successes of partnership working with England Lacrosse, AoC Sport and The Lacrosse Foundation all contributing to give access to workforce and equipment to stimulate participation and allow people to discover their passion for the sport.

HIGHER EDUCATION

At the Higher Education level, the disruption to university structures and full-time sport staff, as well as hybrid learning models, has impacted the continuity of the HE offer, and interventions such as the University Lacrosse Officer programme. A refocusing of the ULO programme, with 25 officers deployed in target universities haseen a 4% participation increase from October 2022 as numbers continue to positively recover towards 2019 levels.

62% NEW PLAYERS

62% of players have not played lacrosse before attending university. 11% represent low socio economic groups.

Through extensive surveying as part of our ULO Programme we have clearly established the links between regular lacrosse activity and improvements in mental health and general wellbeing. As a result, the more we are able to capitalise on the potential of the ULO Programme and similar programmes in other sectors, the more the sport can have a positive effect outside of the immediate benefits of taking part in sport.

The HE sector as a whole has been a hugely notable success for the sport over the last decade both in terms of pure participation, and now in providing a platform for the expansion of the talent pool.

We have so many talented athletes within our universities and it's now our job to work with them and the HE sector to make the most of those abilities, and help to give them routes into the sport after their time in education.

PRIMARY & SECONDARY

We have also recently reviewed the reach into state primary and secondary education with the data showing a 43.5% increase in children (in primary and secondary schools) across England who have been exposed to Lacrosse since September 2022, with 25% in schools in the lowest areas of deprivation, again supporting narrowing inequalities and widening activity provision in young people.

The use of workforce training to stimulate increased activity in this sector is also a central pillar to us as seen in the Lacrosse Accredited Colleges Scheme.

In a new initiative to engage with certain areas of deprivation we have worked with the Metropolitan Police Force Engagement team to provide sport specific training to deliver in Barnet, Brent and Harrow across six secondary schools, then giving them the skills to go forward with the training learned into further schools.

REGIONAL CASE STUDY

GREATER MANCHESTER DEVELOPMENT

The primary focus of the Greater Manchester Development Officer has been to build relationships between community clubs and School game officers, in working to understand the needs and requirements of key partners to ensure the sustainability of the project. The GMDO has worked with all the boroughs in Greater Manchester that are delivering lacrosse and has started to extend into areas that lacrosse has previously struggled in or had no Lacrosse being played (Bolton & East Cheshire).

The post has seen coaching programmes re-establish in Tameside, East & West Cheshire, Oldham and Bolton with the establishment of out of school hours community delivery being a priority over the next period.

The work of the GMDO directly engaged with 700 pupils across the season and has now identified the need to work on recruiting and training coaches in the GM area to assist clubs with their school programmes.



FINANCIAL STATEMENT 2022/23

The board agreed a robust financial plan to support lacrosse activity for 2022-23 and this plan was focused in making the final steps in recovering from the pandemic as all areas returned to full activity.

The return of all our activities was very welcome and the finances for the period reflect this (see charts). The return of all international and domestic competition was especially welcome and again this activity can be seen in the figures.

The board met regularly with the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) to review the plan, assess finances and risk and agree future actions during the year to support our members and partners in delivering Lacrosse.

As reported last year, England Lacrosse secured £2,962,000 Sport England System Partner grant for the period 1st April 2022 to 31st March 2027. The award supports our systems and governance, increasing diversity in all that we do as well as supporting some of our delivery and talent programmes. This support for lacrosse is really welcome alongside our other contributions from our members and partners.

The annual report details the activity undertaken during the year. To support the return of lacrosse post pandemic the board agreed a deficit budget of (£95,000). Due to the work of staff and our finance committee we realised an end of year figure of (£71,365). Whilst recognising that this is still a loss, a 24% improvement of the actual figure versus the budget is a good outcome to the year's finances.
